oseph Bomba was the son of Franz Bomba and Veronica Sapock. His wife Franciska was the daughter of Franz Pinkawa and Josepha Giemsa. In 1855 Joseph and Franciska immigrated to Texas with their six surviving children. They briefly settled in Panna Maria, and in 1856 Franciska was one of four official witnesses listed in the baptismal book where Father Leopold recorded the blessing of the new church (Dworaczyk, 1945, p. 30). After four years in this rural community, Joseph owned 2 horses, 18 cattle, oxen, and hogs valued at \$242 (Karnes County Tax Assessments, 1859, 11th page). One year later, the Bombas moved to DeWitt County where they owned 100 acres valued at \$250 (U.S. Agricultural Census, DeWitt County, 1860, p. 31, entry #23). In 1862 they purchased 110 acres on the southwest side of Coleto Creek in the Meyersville area (DeWitt County Deed Records, Volume I, p. 792).

During the Civil War, Joseph served with the Coleto Guards under Captain Robert Kleberg. As a reserve company, this unit was formed to repel an invasion of Texas (Texas State Archives, Record Group 401).

Joseph was tall, had blue eyes, and his gray hair had once been blonde. He raised corn and fruit on their farm. Franciska was typical of all little grandmothers, and she wore a knitted or crocheted cap whenever she went out. They had a nice house with a big bedroom and a large upstairs area (Bomba, 1980, unpaged).

In the 1890s, the Bombas moved to Papalote in nearby Bee County with other family members (Bomba, 1980, unpaged). By 1900 Franciska, a widow, was living with one of her grandchildren in Papalote (Federal Census, Bee County, Texas, 1900).

## Obituary of Joseph Bomba

Mr. Joseph Bomba, Sr., Dead.

MEYERSVILLE, February 8.

Saturday evening at 9 o'clock Mr. Joseph Bomba, Sr., died of paralysis at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Gregozeczyki, at Papalote, Bee county, where he and his wife have been since 1897. He was born in German Poland on March the 19th, 1810, and was 88 years old his last birthday.

He was married at the age of 22 and had seven children, three boys and four girls His wife and two sons. Joseph and Tye of Meyers-ville, and one daughter, Albina, survive him.

He came to Pana Maria, Karnes county, Texas, with his family in 1855. He was a stranger among strangers and had nothing except his ability and willingness to work.

During the war he hauled freight between Galveston and the Rio Grande and after the war he farmed. From 1859 to 1897 he lived on his farm at Meyersville.

In 1882 at Meyersville he celebrated his golden wedding with four children, a great many grandchildren and some great grandchildren.

He was a life-long, prominent and devoted member of the Catholic church and was buried in the Catholic cemetery at Papalote.

A memorial window in the Catholic church at Meyersville serves to commemorate the names and religious charity of him and his wife. May his soul rest in peace.
