

nton Moczygemba was a single man when he immigrated with other family members in 1854. Soon after arriving in Texas, he married Philippina, the daughter of Jacob Wenz and Elizabeth Peter. Their marriage in 1855 was the first recorded in Panna Maria by Anton's brother, Father Leopold Moczygemba (see Moczygemba Family Chart in the Thomas Moczygemba profile). By May 14, 1858, the baptism date of their son Leopold, Anton and Philippina were residing in San Antonio. The 1860 Bexar County census indicates that Philippina's widowed mother and grandmother were living in the adjacent household. Later in 1866, the Anton Moczygemba family was one of 36 families that comprised the original congregation of St. Michael Church (Dworaczyk, 1936, p. 91).

The 1870 census indicates Anton was a saddler, and in 1872 he owned a town lot valued at \$1,200 (Bexar County Tax Assessments, 1872, p. 74). By the end of the decade, Anton was a saddler with the U.S. Arsenal, located in the 600 block of South Flores Street, and he and his family lived on the north side of Alameda Street (present-day East Commerce Street) between Live Oak and Bowie streets (Morrison & Fourmy's General Directory of the City of San Antonio, for 1879-80, p. 197). The 1880 census lists Anton as a saddler residing with his family on Chestnut Street.

On June 29, 1884, Anton and Philippina's newly ordained son, Reverend Leopold Moczygemba, celebrated his First Solemn Mass in Lemont, Illinois, at Sts. Cyril and Methodius Catholic Church (*Diamond Jubilee*, p. 21). Tragically, almost eight years later at age 33, Reverend Leopold passed away on April 14, 1892, and was buried four days later in the parish cemetery (Sts. Cyril and Methodius Record of Interments, p.5).

By 1900 Anton and Philippina were living near Chicago in Joliet, Illinois, with a daughter and son-in-law, Maria and Peter Maday. Anton was still working, not as a saddler, but as a clerk. In 1907 Anton died when he was 80 years old. Twenty-four years later, Philippina passed away, and her obituary notices proclaimed that she was 94 years old. Anton and Philippina are both buried in Sts. Cyril and Methodius Cemetery in Lemont, Illinois, where their son, Reverend Leopold Moczygemba, was also laid to rest.



This wedding on August 9, 1855, was the first one recorded at the Immaculate Conception of the BVM Catholic Church in Panna Maria, Texas. The parents of the groom were Leopold Moczygemba and Ewa Krawietz, and the bride's parents were Jacob Wenz and Elizabeth Peter. The witnesses were Nicolaus Krawietz and Paul Labus. The record was transcribed in Latin, including the spelling of names, by the groom's brother, Reverend Leopold Moczygemba (p. 1, entry #1, LDS Microfilm #0025335).

ugust Moczygemba was unmarried when he immigrated to Texas in 1854. He settled in Panna Maria and worked for his brother, Father Leopold Moczygemba (see Leopold Moczygemba profile), in an unrecorded capacity (Baker, 1974, p. 387; 1975b, p. 132). In the 1860 Bexar County census, August was listed as a shoemaker in San Antonio and was living next door to his brother Anton who was a saddler (see Moczygemba Family Chart in the Thomas Moczygemba profile).

A couple of years later, August returned to Panna Maria, and in 1863 he married Maria Yosko. Gervas Gabrysch served as a witness to their wedding vows. August and Maria soon built a stone house which still stands across the street from the Immaculate Conception of the BVM Church at Panna Maria (Dworaczyk, 1936, p. 21; Baker, 1975b, p. 132). August, Maria, and their four children were listed in the 1870 Karnes County census, and August's occupation was again listed as a shoemaker. In 1876 August owned one town lot valued at \$415 as well as 4 horses, 10 cattle, and 5 goats (Przygoda, 1971, p. 150).

Interestingly, Maria registered a cattle brand prior to 1865 (see above Jackson and Long, 1865, p. 79). August registered a similar brand in 1876 (Karnes County Marks and Brands, Volume 1, p. 47, #1785).

In 1889 August owned 2 lots valued at \$360, a carriage or wagon worth \$5, 2 horses assessed at \$50, 12 cattle valued at \$60, and 5 hogs worth \$5 (Polish Footprints, 1999, Volume XVI, Number 1, p. 28). Maria died in 1890 and was buried in the parish cemetery at Panna Maria. Ten years later, August was recorded in the 1900 Karnes County census living with his daughter Anna and her husband, Peter Dupnik. When August died in 1907, his funeral Mass was at Holy Trinity Catholic Church in Falls City, but he was buried next to his wife Maria in Panna Maria.

Maria's burial record, written in Latin, indicates that she was buried on February 24, 1890, in the Panna Maria cemetery. It states that she was the wife (*uxoris*) of August Moczygemba and reveals her age as 50. The last three words translate as "who died yesterday." The transcription was signed by Reverend Felix Zwiardowski (Immaculate Conception of the BVM Catholic Church, Panna Maria, Texas, p. 19, LDS Microfilm #0025335).

ohan was the son of Stanislaus Moczigemba, a soldier, and Zophia Smieszek (see Moczygemba Family Chart in the Thomas Moczygemba profile). In 1841 Johan married Marya who was the daughter of Vincent Feluks and Zophia Rzepka. Johan and Marya immigrated to Texas in 1854. Less than six months later, Johan helped his cousin, Father Leopold Moczygemba (see Leopold Moczygemba profile), inspect stone for the construction of the first church at Panna Maria (Baker, 1974, p. 384; 1975a, p. 20). It was also in May that Johan wrote to friends and relatives in Poland urging them to immigrate, making suggestions regarding goods to bring with them, and providing descriptions of life in Panna Maria.

"When you come I will show you everything. You will live in my room with me...you ask what kind of leather; buy all that you can for boots and shoes and the whole strip for soles, because here they exist but are very expensive. It is difficult to go with bare feet, because there are various thorns and reptiles....Don't wonder that we ask for so many things, because here there are no people and that's why no things. There are no villages. One cottage lies from the other ten miles or even more....I have six cows and five calves and two oxen and one mule for work and one mare...all my animals cost 198 dollars....There is no prepared land, but everybody must get it ready for himself, because the land is covered with trees and bushes and no one has ploughed it before...there is Turkish wheat....Potatoes are of two kinds....Some people took some of all kinds of grain, and it grows beautifully....And when you come, take all vegetables with you, and particularly beans, so much so you could give some to me....Here one can get a house very easily, and everybody builds his house himself. Here there is no winter....You can plant cotton, which is very expensive, and I, Johan Moczigemba, plan to grow it...buy me three harrows...and leather for boots...and half a hundredweight of hemp...bring a wagon for me...bring two plough blades and one strong winch..." (Baker, 1974, pp. 383-386).





County where his brothers and cousins settled (see Moczygemba Family Chart in the Thomas Moczygemba profile). John soon relocated to San Antonio where he married Carmen Cadena in 1857. According to the 1860 Bexar County census, John was employed as a milkman.

When the Civil War began, John enlisted and served for four years (see photograph on next page). After the war, John returned to his family in San Antonio, but by late 1869 he was living in Ft. Stockton in west Texas. Presidio County records reveal that on December 3, 1869, John was elected Justice of the Peace for Precinct 1 and was soon embroiled in numerous conflicts between military and civil rule (Baker, 1979, pp. 96-97; Williams, 1982, p. 127). By July of 1870, John was listed as a store clerk in the same community (Federal Census, Presidio County, Texas, 1870, p. 536).

John appeared in the 1870 Bexar County census with his wife and children (see family photograph on next page). His occupation was listed as saddler, while the 1880 census indicated he was a laborer. In 1887-1888 John was a canvasser [salesman] for the Singer Sewing Machine Company, and he and Carmen resided at 615 Ruiz Street (*Morrison & Fourmy's General Directory of the City of San Antonio*, 1887-88, p. 241). A few years later, the local newspaper reported that John was building an elegant residence on Perez Street (*San Antonio Daily Light*, 22 March 1890, p. 8). By 1895-1896 John was still working for the Singer Sewing Machine Company and living at 201 Perez Street (Appler, 1896, p. 434).

John Moczygemba died in 1908, and according to funeral home records at Zizik-Kearns, his family ordered 15 coaches for the funeral procession (Zizik Funeral Records, p. 150).

### John Moczygemba

John Moczygemba was mustered into service by Colonel Philip Noland Luckett and served as a sergeant in Captain R. B. Maclin's Company, First Regiment Texas Light Artillery (National Archives Records Service, General Services Administration, Roll 238; Confederate Pension Application #3781). Carmen sought financial assistance from the government and on March 6, 1863, received \$10 (McMinus, 1985, p. 8).







oseph and Tecla Moczygemba sailed in 1854 from the port of Bremen to a new life in Texas. Tecla's father, Albert Zienc, and her younger brother John travelled with them (*Galveston Zeitung*, 9 December 1854, p. 2). Sadly, Tecla died on the voyage leaving Joseph with several young children (Baker, 1975b, p. 130; 1979, p. 149). Joseph and the children travelled on to Panna Maria with his brothers, Anton and August, where their brother, Father Leopold Moczygemba, planned a new settlement (see Moczygemba Family Chart in the Thomas Moczygemba profile).

In 1855 Johan Moczygemba wrote to relatives in Silesia and included the following regarding his cousin Joseph: "When he came, he was alone, but it was not so hard as in Silesia, because here he can breed whatever animals he wants and it costs nothing. He told me that with the help of God he could sell his wheat for one hundred dollars this year" (Baker, 1974, p. 387). More of this letter appears in the Johan Moczygemba profile.

In November of 1855, Joseph wed Carolina Szyguda (see next page). Their marriage was the second one recorded at Panna Maria by Father Leopold Moczygemba.



oseph Moczygemba, a widower with several children, married Carolina, the daughter of Casimer Schyguda and Rosalia Gas, in late 1855 (see Casimer Schyguda profile). By 1859 Joseph owned 11 cattle, oxen, and hogs valued at \$150 (Karnes County Tax Assessments, 1859, 10th page). The following year, Joseph purchased 70 acres of land for \$441. Seven years later, the 70 acres were worth only \$100, and his other assets included 3 horses, 20 cattle, and miscellaneous property valued at \$332 (Karnes County Tax Assessments, 1866, p. 9). By 1889 Joseph's assets included 101 acres of land valued at \$490, a town lot assessed at \$10, a carriage or wagon, 6 horses, 14 cattle, and a hog (Polish Footprints, 1999, Volume XVI, Number 1, p. 28).

Joseph and Carolina's daughter Joanna was in the convent at Castroville in the early 1870s. Thomas, their son, remembered going there with his father to remove his sister Joanna so she could join the Blue Sisters (Dworaczyk, 1936, p. 54; Callahan, 1955, p. 106). In 1877 Joseph was one of 10 parishioners to generously donate \$100 to the second church constructed at Panna Maria (Dworaczyk, 1936, pp. 51-52).

In 1890 Joseph and Carolina experienced the joyful occasion of their son Thomas' ordination as a Catholic priest. "Following studies for the priesthood in the Jesuit seminary in Seguin and the diocesan seminary in Victoria, he was ordained in the latter city Jan. 5, 1890." (San Antonio Light, 1 January 1950, p. 12). Only Carolina would live to celebrate Thomas' silver jubilee when his Pamieatka [souvenir] cards reflecting the years 1890-1915 were distributed as keepsakes in San Antonio, Texas.

In their later years, Joseph and Carolina lived at different times with two of their sons, Jacob and Ignatz. Prior to his father's death in 1912, Jacob wrote to relatives in Silesia: "Mother is afraid that he will go mad because he is thinking about the old country, about his Fathers even though they've been lying in their graves for a long time..." (Baker, 1979, p. 149; 1982, p. 94). When Carolina died in 1917, her obituary pointed out that she was known to many as "Grandma Moczygemba" and was one of the earliest settlers in Panna Maria. She died at the home of her son Ignatz (Karnes County News, 15 March 1917, p. 8).







homas, the son of Stanislaus Moczigemba and Zophia Smieszek, was a second cousin to Father Leopold Moczygemba. His wife, Katarzina Kruppa, was the daughter of Johan Kruppa and Francisca Rzepka. When the excitement of moving to America spread through their village of Płużnica Wielka, it is possible that Thomas and Katarzina had planned to travel to Texas with some of their neighbors who left in 1854, but their plans were delayed due to the death of their young son Ignatz. This tragedy prompted a letter: "Dear Brother...Now about your dead son, you don't need to conceal it. You must take a death certificate from the local officer of the community council, because you have had your passport for a long time..."(letter from Johan Moczygemba in Texas to his brother Thomas, dated 13 May 1855, Four Letters from Texas to Poland in 1855, The Southwestern Historical Quarterly, Volume 77, No. 3, pp. 381-389, Baker, 1974).

With their four remaining children, Thomas and Katarzina departed Bremen on October 1, 1855. Their daughter Marianna, who had just celebrated her eleventh birthday, remembered the journey and the rough seas. She told of a particular storm so fierce that her father and mother called their children together; they held hands and prayed that God would keep them safe. The storm passed, and they sailed again (Recorded interviews by Radio Free Europe, December 1963, interviewees included grandsons, Ludwig Dziuk and Johann Dziuk).

When Thomas, Katarzina, and their children arrived in Texas, they were welcomed by his brother and sister along with his second cousins, the four Moczygemba brothers who had come a year earlier (see Moczygemba Family Chart in this profile). After settling in Texas, Thomas wrote to his parents and friends in Płużnica Wielka, Silesia. He reassured them of his safe journey (see letter in this profile).

Karnes County records reveal a close bond among the original Moczygemba immigrants. Deed records show their farms were near one another. Three Moczygembas registered their cattle brands on the same summer day (Karnes County Marks and Brands, Volume I, p. 200), and livestock trading indicates handling of sales for one another (Karnes County Beef Register, p. 71).

In 1860 Thomas had 2 horses, 12 milk cows, 6 working oxen, 45 other cattle, 160 bushels of Indian corn, and 100 pounds of butter (U.S. Agricultural Census, Karnes County, 1860, p. 35, entry #39). In that same year, Thomas purchased 75 acres from John Twohig for \$434.91 (Karnes County Deed Records, Volume C, pp. 4-5).

Thomas is listed as one of the original 70 parishioners who financially supported the reconstruction of the present church in Panna Maria (Dworaczyk, 1936, p. 51).

The Schüler Agency List contains the names and ages of Thomas Moczygemba, age 38, his wife Catharina Kruppa, age 34, and their children Franz, age 12; Marianna, age 10; Johann, age 8; and Stephan, age 4. The fourth column identifies Thomas' occupation as a bauer [farmer], and the fifth column reveals their residence; the village name is listed in German. The Moczygemba family is shown as being from Gr. Pluschnitz which is now Płużnica Wielka, Poland (Jonca, 1998, p. 69).

### Thomas Moczygemba Letter to Poland

In this letter from Thomas Moczygemba, also signed by Johan Dziuk, Thomas is advising family and friends in Poland that they had arrived in Texas in good health and are thankful to God for their safe journey.

He recommends contracting with the Schüler Agency for their own journeys to Texas if they decide to emigrate. He assures them that Mr. Schüler is a trustworthy agent.

Greetings to parents, family, and friends are expressed.



#### Moczygemba Family Chart

Curiosity about the Moczygemba family relationship launched a search into the Płużnica Wielka church records. Documentation from Św. Stanisława, provided by Father Stanisław Bober, identified the two families who left Silesia for Texas. Their common progenitor was Georg Moczygemba. The first Texas Moczygemba families were second cousins.

Father Leopold and his four brothers who immigrated were Anton, August, Johann, and Joseph. These five men were sons of Leopold Moczygemba and Ewa Krawietz.

Thomas Moczygemba, his brother, Johan Moczygemba, and their sister, Marianna Moczygemba Felux, were the children of Stanislaus Moczygemba and Zophia Smieszek.


